## **President's Report**

It will come as no surprise when I say COVID-19 forced us to change how we tackle the challenges facing Lambton County's most vulnerable. Our United Way helped those most in need

in our community, and at the same time continued to fund our agencies at the appropriate levels throughout 2020 into 2021.

With the creation of the United Way of Sarnia-Lambton Compassion Fund, we raised almost \$100,000 to fund 20 different local organizations as they struggled through the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, the Federal Government showed their confidence in the United Way movement and provided additional funding to more specific groups in emergency need.

In total over \$550,000, in addition to our regular annual campaign, was available to flow through United Way to community agencies. More than 40% of those funding decisions were to agencies that were not previously funded by the United Way of Sarnia-Lambton.

Thank you to the United Way Board of Directors for their assistance and speed when getting the funds out to those agencies in need; in many cases, it was less than 24 hours. I would also like to thank the Federal Government of Canada, and each donor for placing their trust in United Way.

While we did not reach the \$1.9 million Needs Target, we did raise over \$1.75 million during what was a trying time for so many employees, companies, small businesses, and other individuals in our community. This accomplishment was thanks to our loyal donors, several new donors and the new online payroll fundraising system that was introduced to many employee campaigns in 2020.

The needs in our community have changed and United Way must pivot so it can continue to focus on Lambton County's most vulnerable. United Way of Sarnia-Lambton funding priorities will now focus on emergency essential services for life, as part of our Poverty to Possibility strategy. We plan to continue funding youth programs, under the heading All That Kids Can Be, and Healthy People, Strong Communities will focus funding on seniors as well as mental health programming targeted to reduce isolation depression, reduce suicides, and assist with a growing addictions issue in our community.

I am optimistic about 2021. We hope the more than 3000 donors and all of our volunteers from past years will join us to help make this a great year as we transition our campaign with less printed materials and more digital content, plus the refocus of our program funding.

A special thank you to our outgoing board members, Christopher Hawksworth, Mary Ellen Edlington, as well as Al McChesney and Rima Rizkallah who have reached their 10-year maximum on the board. We look forward to working with four new members: Lynn Findlay, Kathy Sitter, Bharat Thakkar, and Cathy Thompson.

Finally, I must thank the United Way Staff for their contribution and willingness to adapt and learn new processes as we quickly transitioned in 2020. Thank you all very much for your impactful contribution.

# By the Numbers

• **85** new non-workplace donors through online or mail.

- **\$565,207.41** COVID-19 relief funding (ECSF, New Horizons, Compassion Fund) that was granted to local programs and services by United Way of Sarnia-Lambton.
- **58** COVID-19 emergency response grants awarded to help local non-profits meet the basic needs of our most vulnerable.
- **26** non-member agencies received emergency funding grants.

# Your Donation At Work in 2020

- The United Way funded Distress and Tel-Check lines saw an increase of over 8000 calls from 2019 to 2020.
- 28 local children with autism who would normally attend the United Way funded Autism Summer Camp received bi-weekly activity kits delivered to their doorstep. The kits included crafts, activities, and sensory items for both play and calming for over-stimulation.

 80% of rural participants in the United Way funded Opening Doors program said they would have been completely isolated without the virtual classes. Attendance numbers doubled when programming went online with 90% of participants reporting an improvement in their mental health.
