Program Descriptions

The permanent Warming Shelter currently provides shelter to 8 clients per night and is at or near capacity every night.

The shelter meets clients' basic physiological needs of shelter, warmth, food, water, sleep, and clothing.

Secondary needs include providing appropriate programming to assist clients with mental health and wellness strategies to overcome addiction, trauma, and/or mental health problems. Part of this programming includes "wrap-around" services and referrals to other program and services in Walpole Island First Nation and local communities.







Results

100% of clients requiring medical attention received assistance with referrals, especially psychiatry, medication, medical assessments and any other needs they had

The Shelter provides connections to addictions workers multiple times per week for 100% of clients requesting this assistance

100% of clients within the shelter are encouraged to engage in daily life skills chores and routines, including making their beds, keeping their personal area tidy, daily hygiene, collecting their laundry, assisting with the grocery shopping and other day to day tasks
